As our nation's capital grows, its neighborhoods have evolved, some undergoing significant change and transition in just the past decade. *WETA Neighborhoods* goes beyond the trendy restaurants and shops and digs into the past of some of the District's significant and diverse neighborhoods, profiling the people and places at the crossroads of these changes.

Think you know your neighborhood? Think again.

Featured in Georgetown:

Martin's Tavern – A well-known hangout for politicos and students alike, where a young John F. Kennedy proposed to his wife. As political pundit Chris Matthews attests, "It's got a real Washington D.C. feel to it."

Mount Zion United Methodist Church and Cemetery – The venerable landmarks upholding the neighborhood's connection to the African American community.

Rose Park – Long before the Williams sisters, tennis phenoms Margaret and Roumania Peters learned the game on O Street, NW, on their way to decorated careers on the American Tennis Association circuit.

Spy Craft – Discovering a clandestine past on unassuming street corners with former FBI agent David Major and former KGB chief of foreign counterintelligence Oleg Kalugin.

Featured in Dupont Circle:

Dupont Farmer's Market, Restaurant Nora and **Soupergirl** – From establishing America's first certified organic restaurant to creating (and feeding) a demand for fresh, local ingredients and products, these purveyors influence the way Washingtonians cook and eat.

Dupont Underground – An abandoned streetcar station is transformed into an experimental laboratory celebrating the arts.

Featured in Capitol Hill:

Rose's Luxury – One the country's hottest restaurants, chef/owner Aaron Silverman remains committed to staying local: "We're trying to be a neighborhood restaurant, for our neighbors." **Capitol Hill Restoration Society** – Exploring the historic charm of alleys, homes and gardens that date back to the early years of Washington D.C's development.

Peterbug Shoe Repair Academy – Profiling a community leader teaching entrepreneurship through the art of shoe repair for nearly 40 years.

Congressional Cemetery – The final resting place of noteworthy citizens such as J. Edgar Hoover, revitalized thanks to community efforts such as the annual Day of the Dog festival.

Featured in Anacostia:

Anacostia: The Series – Behind-the-scenes with the Daytime Emmy® award-winning online scripted drama putting this up-and-coming neighborhood on the map.

Anacostia River – One of the nation's most polluted rivers is experiencing a comeback, thanks to the efforts of conservation groups -- and one dedicated photographer.

Anacostia Community Museum – Inspiring the next generation to participate in the flourishing arts scene with local painter and portrait artist Jay Coleman.
