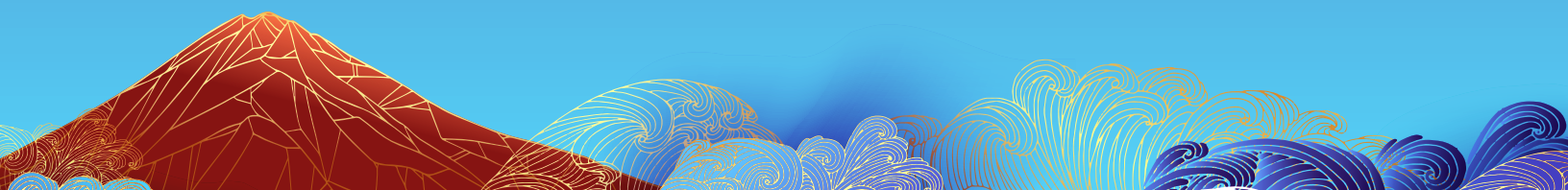

THE QUIETEST PLACE ON EARTH — On Hawaii's island of Maui, the Haleakala volcano rises nearly two miles into the sky. The massive crater located at its summit carries the unique distinction of being "the quietest place on Earth." This poetic documentary explores Maui's geological and spiritual birthplace through the eyes of Hawaiian people.

THE STORY OF CHINA — This six-part series, written and presented by historian Michael Wood, explores the history of China from the ancient past to present day.

Episode 1. Ancestors. Wood examines ancient myths, archaeological sites, and the first records of Chinese writing.

Episode 2. Silk Roads and China Ships. Michael Wood explores China's first international age, the Tang Dynasty, uncovering the coming of Christianity and tracking the spread of Chinese culture across East Asia.

PACIFIC HEARTBEAT: POI: THE STORY OF OUR SONG — Learn about a song that was able to bridge cultures and change lives.

Traveling through the remains of the Indus Valley civilization to the Ganges Plain, Wood discovers various archeological artifacts that shed light on the country's early history.

LOCAL, USA KŪ KANAKA: STAND TALL — In August 1969, 15-year-old Terry Young became paralyzed from the neck down after taking a dive from a rock wall perch. Following the incident, Young graduated high school, completed college, earned a PhD, and was a founding faculty member of the School of Hawaiian Studies at University of Hawaii-Manoa. This episode follows his inspirational story from the accident up to his death in 2008.

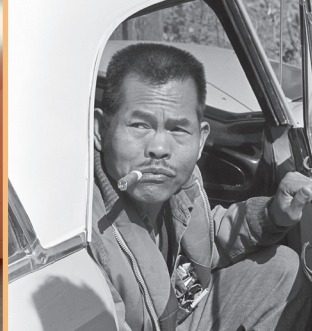

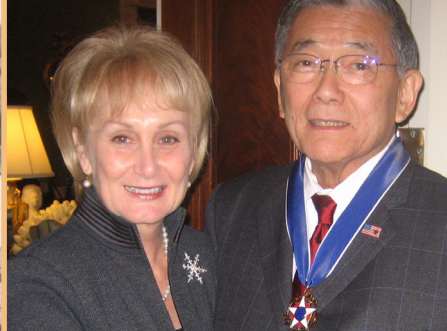
